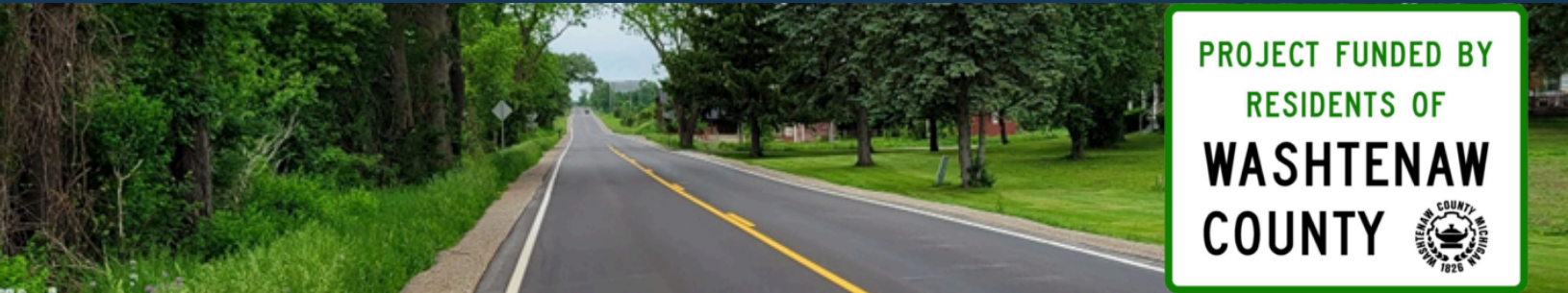

Countywide Roads & Non-Motorized Millage

Washtenaw County voters are being asked to renew and restore the four-year County-Wide Roads and Non-Motorized Millage, on the August 6, 2024 ballot.

This 0.5 mill property tax is levied in each winter tax bill.

Money collected is invested into road and non-motorized projects in the following construction season (2025, 2026, 2027 and 2028) that immediately follows.



In 2023, WCRC resurfaced Bemis Rd between Moon Rd & Warner Rd in Pittsfield & York Townships with funds from the millage.

What's the deal with Sealcoat?

Washtenaw County road users will now see "Loose Stones - 35 mph" signs on various roadways. WCRC's annual sealcoat program is an important strategy in WCRC's efforts to maintain its 1,600+ mile road network. When applied at the right time, a sealcoat treatment can extend the lifespan of a road and help keep potholes at bay. This summer, WCRC will sealcoat approximately 30 miles of roadway.

Chipseal

During chip seal, which is the first part of sealcoat, a thin film of heated liquid asphalt is sprayed onto the road surface, followed immediately by the placement of small aggregate/stones ("chips"). The chips are then embedded into the liquid asphalt with rollers.

Once the chip seal application has been completed, the excess stone will be swept off the road surface.

Fogseal

The second part of sealcoat is fog seal. A fog seal is another thin layer of liquid asphalt that helps to seal in the stones and extends the life of a chip seal. WCRC crews will apply a fog seal within a couple of weeks after a road has been chip sealed, depending on the weather. Once applied, fog seal can take up to a couple of hours to cure.

Once the road has been fog sealed, WCRC's contractor will apply the permanent pavement markings.
